

Application Form 'Valorisatie' prize

This form is used to apply for the yearly 'valorization' prize of FASoS. This prize will be awarded during the research heidag on 8 November 2018 to an individual or a group. Projects should demonstrate that they build on existing research at FASoS and that they have created a demonstrable societal impact. 'Impact' is defined as an effect on, change or benefit to the economy, society, culture, public policy or services, health, the environment or quality of life, beyond academia. This means that you should focus on activities or other output that included stakeholders outside of academia either as an audience or as participants of your research. The prize is not restricted to any specific form or definition of 'valorization' activities.

Submissions will also be used by the research policy office to get a more complete overview of valorization activities going on at FASoS and may be used for promotional activities (e.g the Annual Scientific Report; for the website <https://www.maastrichtuniversity.nl/research/institutes/fasos-research-institute/valorisatie-fasos>) after consultation with the colleagues who have submitted the case study.

1. Application forms have to be completed by 15 October 2018. They are to be submitted electronically to research-FASoS@maastrichtuniversity.nl
2. The indicated lengths of the sections below are suggestions. You can expand or shorten them, but please stick to the overall maximum of 1.000 words (not including supporting material).

1. Name

2. Title and summary of the impact (indicative maximum 100 words)

This section should briefly state what specific activities and impacts are described in the case study.

3. Underpinning research (indicative maximum 300 words)

This section should briefly outline the research in the context of which impact was generated. It should include information on who (which FASoS staff or external partners) was part of the research, and in what role. References to key project publications may be included.

4. Details of the impact (indicative maximum 500 words)

This section should explain:

- The activities, the process or means through which the research led to, underpinned or made a contribution to the impact (for example, how it was disseminated, how it came to influence users or beneficiaries, or how it came to be exploited, taken up or applied).
- Details of the beneficiaries – who or what has benefitted, been affected or impacted on.
- Dates of when these impacts occurred.

Any evidence that you have on how beneficiaries used / interacted with your research should be mentioned. If applicable, material used to create impact (e.g. policy briefs, presentations, reports, web pages) should be attached or referenced (if available in the public domain).

5. Short motivation (indicative maximum 100 words)

Provide a short statement on how you plan to spend the prize money (for example ‘use for a workshop including non-academic partners with a clear “valorisatie” dimension).
